This summer, our camp embarked on a unique experiment to assess the impact of having multiple strong leaders in key leadership roles. Traditionally, each top leadership position at summer camp is filled by a single individual. However, this year, we appointed two Summer Program Directors, Joyse Saravria-Smith and Kelley Thompson—and two Summer Camp Pastors—Celmali Jamie and Vini Quinteros. Alongside them were our usual Head Male and Head Female Counselors, a Head Cook, and a Program Assistant Supervisor, each distinguished as strong leaders and each making a meaningful shift in their roles.

It was a privilege to witness the unfolding of this summer's events. The experience

brought back memories of the summer of 2014, my first year directing summer camp. WEEKEND GROUP COST CORNER

Camp hosts retreat groups on weekends year round.

The goal is to be an affordable place for people to fellowship, build relationships, and be refreshed. Guests typical stay is 2 nights and 5 meals. On average, Camp charges \$169 per adult, but it actually costs \$214.11.

Here's a breakdown of this cost:

Administration 30% -- \$64.23 Guest Services 23% -- \$49.25 Food Services 33% -- \$70.65 Lodging 14% -- \$29.97
